At Berrien Springs Public Schools, our commitment and care for students' post-secondary success is at the forefront with the opportunities the district offers through Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs.

CTE programs are offered to all high school students, affording the opportunity for high wage, high need, and high demand employment experiences and opportunities upon completion of their program. These programs are rigorous, preparing students for the ever-evolving demands and challenges of industry and providing the necessary employability skills.

Successful completion of CTE courses will prepare students for vocational mastery necessary for entry level work. Classes incorporate real world hands-on experiences that are invaluable, developing the whole child while gaining the technical know-how and first hand experiences necessary to have a successful career.

Berrien Springs is proud to host six programs: Firefighting, Emergency Medical Technician (EMT), Construction Trades, Law Enforcement, Business Management, and Accounting. In addition, students have 59 additional options around the county.

February is CTE month, and we celebrate the dedication of our staff: Rich Albers, Brandi Narregan, Corey Burks, David Tripp, and Larry Jackson, and the success of all students enrolled in these programs.

Every year over a million students in the United States are identified as homeless according to the McKinney Vento Act that was enacted by President Reagan in 1987. This federal law has been implemented in our district and serves students that do not have a residence that is fixed, regular and/

or adequate. These most at-risk students are identified in various ways primarily through our enrollment process. Once identified, students are eligible for a variety of services including, but not limited to, free meals at school, assistance with transportation to and from school, and necessary school supplies. Berrien County McKinney Vento liaisons regularly collaborate to

ensure we are meeting the needs of our McKinney Vento students.

Berrien Springs Public Schools also works with other community agencies to help provide resources to families. Many food pantries in our area supply needed food. There are also resources for housing, rent and utility assistance. Our district also partners with *Backpacks for Berrien* to supply these students

with weekend food bags. In emergency situations, motel vouchers are available as well as shelter referrals. The main goal of all these services is to break down the barriers for these students so they can maintain regular school attendance.

Berrien Springs Public Schools strives to provide a positive learning environment for all students.

The team proposes meaningful and contextualized adjustments to building policies, procedures and practices while keeping the best interests of students at the heart of all decisions. The team is committed to providing students with the foundational skills they will need to be productive students who are capable of developing and maintaining positive relationships at school.

The team is headed up by PBIS teacher, Mr. Jason Constable, and made up of at least one teacher representative for each grade level. The current members of the PBIS team at Sylvester are Mr. Jason Constable (PBIS Teacher and Committee Chairman), Mrs. Sonja Cullings (Sylvester Dean of Students), Ms. Brittany Mercier (Special Education Teacher), Ms. Melydia Rogers (EL Paraprofessional), Ms. Melissa McNeely (Third Grade Teacher representative), Mrs. Katie Stark and Mrs. Julie Terry (Fourth Grade Teacher representatives), and Mrs. Wendy Hoskins (Fifth Grade Teacher representative).

Berrien Springs Public Schools is a district of choices! Secondary students enrolled at the Berrien Springs Virtual Academy (BSVA) have numerous creative learning options with the intention of meeting the needs of the individual learner. Within this program, there are students who not only complete virtual programming at the Virtual Academy building, but there are students taking classes around the county utilizing the following opportunities:

- ♣ Project Lead the Way (PLTW) Science courses
- ♣ Career and Technical Education (CTE) courses in schools around Berrien County
- ♣ Early Middle College courses offered at LMC and

SMC

- ♣ The Math and Science Center at Andrews University
- ♣ Hybrid schedules as part-time students attending BSHS and BSVA
- ♣ Band, Choir, and Art, along with other electives at BSMS and BSHS
- ♣ Parent Partnership electives which span Berrien County as well

Virtual Academy students are also welcome to participate in clubs, perform in theatrical productions, and attend sporting events as a student spectator at BSMS and BSHS. The academy offers numerous “being there” experiences through field trips and also students can participate in field trips through the Parent Partnership. Students also take part in student council which plan numerous events for the student body and serve as liaisons between

students and staff.

Some students attend the Virtual Academy for a variety of reasons. The Berrien Springs Virtual Academy (BSVA) is an accelerated academic program designed to provide families with a unique learning experience; however, some students challenge themselves to move through coursework more quickly in hopes of graduating sooner. Other students like the flexibility being a virtual student offers. Some students want to work and need non-traditional school hours to do so. Others participate in travel sports and benefit from having control over the time they attend school. Some like the quiet atmosphere the BSVA provides and the one-on-one instruction from the fully certified staff at the BSVA to support individual learning needs. The BSVA

is also a great transition for traditional home school students interested in having a go with a face to face school environment for the first time with the support of their parents.

Families interested in the Berrien Springs Virtual Academy meet with the director before enrollment in order to learn the high standards and opportunities the BSVA has to offer for students, but we also hope to listen, learn, and provide choices for families to personalize learning in ways that are most conducive to the needs of your child!

Discovery Academy students given opportunity to learn math, geometry, and algebra through a virtual reality program called *PRISMS*

The Discovery Academy is utilizing a virtual reality math program called *PRISMS* beginning the second semester of the 2022-23 school year. We believe that virtual reality will enhance math learning as our students will now have the opportunity to complete Algebra, Geometry and Algebra II beyond the two-dimensional

world and enter a three-dimensional environment in which students move freely while interacting with a series of real-life situations and problems.

Students who struggle with focusing and paying attention or those with achievement gaps will especially thrive with the virtual reality learning format. We believe having the virtual reality modules embedded into current coursework will

greatly increase engagement resulting in boosts in understanding and retention of concepts. Albert Einstein stated that “*thinking is muscular*” and as students physically move within the virtual reality environment to build and create, they become involved in the problem solving crosshairs of math and real life that are remembered and recalled in new situations. Studies show that muscle movement

while learning helps students recollect knowledge and reapply it.

Discovery Academy teachers have gone through extensive training and have allowed students to begin exploring the virtual reality world of *PRISMS*, tour the curriculum and get comfortable with the headset device and program. Students were initially given a brief survey about their new experience with virtual reality which revealed strong excitement for continued use and the possibilities moving forward. We will begin the semester with a cohort group of approximately 10-12 students and will carefully evaluate the progress in meeting goals around higher course grades and state test scores. Further surveying around usability, ease of learning and engagement will also happen with goals to increase participation to all Algebra 1, Geometry and Algebra 2 students .



Our Shamrock athletes have worked hard through the long winter to prepare for post-season play. Our wrestling team has a full roster, and although they may not advance to team Regionals, we have a few athletes with the potential to make the individual regionals. Juniors Tyler Dowell, Dylan Russel, and freshman Caylen Tate have winning records and look to be some of the first wrestlers to advance past the first round in recent years.

Our girls' basketball team still has four regular season games remaining. They have an incredibly young roster, but they have the potential to hit the .500 mark on the season. The Lakeland Conference may be the best D2/D3 girls basketball conference in the state. The girls' team will only graduate two seniors, Karii Hurley, and Allison Weigand. Junior Grace Constable, sophomore Aubrie Smith, and freshman Zion Ellis have been the scoring sparks for

the Shamrocks.

The Competitive Cheer team is also very young but boasts great numbers. For the first time in school history, the Shamrocks have been able to put a JV team on the floor at meets. They compete in the large SAC cheerleading conglomerate with schools from the Lakeland, Southwest 10, and the original SAC. They regularly compete against 14 to 16 schools per evening during the week. There have already been some cheer honors awarded. Senior Amara Schneider is First Team SAC. Senior Kirsten Krause and Junior Alayna Wells earned Honorable mention.

The boys' basketball team has had a season full of close contests. Five of their first 15 games have been decided by one basket! They are led by seniors Allen Taylor, Kole Blasko, Desmond Clark, and Josiah Pittman. The team is currently 8-7 and in the middle of the pack in the tough Lakeland Conference. Their schedule is also loaded with great competition that

will prepare them for what they will see in post-season play.

New football coach

Elliot Uzelac has retired from coaching after three years as the head coach of the Shamrocks and over 50 years in football. Our Shamrock varsity teams were 20-8 over those years, and the program won one conference title.

He is looking forward to being able to put his personal stamp on the program while continuing the strong tradition of Shamrock football that dates back to many of our legendary coaching staff.

district football game because of our team's playoff seeding. Our game workers will be very busy this spring (especially our awesome community of track volunteers). It is a credit to them that our events run so smoothly. We truly have a reputation for being one of the best hosts in this part of the state. We have been fortunate to be selected as the host facility for all of the following MHSAA and MITCA tournaments. At a time when many athletic departments start to shut things down for the summer, Berrien Springs might be the busiest place for high school athletics in all of Michigan.
