District's goals include improving student achievement in Reading, Math, and Social Studies over the next three years

Greetings to our staff, students, parents, and community as the school district prepares for the start of a new school year. The summer months have been filled with activities designed to prepare for an exceptional school year. It is our belief that all students be given the opportunity to learn and experience success at school. The district's vision statement: "Together inspiring students to think, learn, achieve and care in a global community," personifies that belief. Our district's goals also support our desire to create opportunities for Berrien Springs students to excel in and out of the classroom.

Our current district goals are

to improve student achievement, specifically in state testing. The targeted areas are Reading, Math, Science, and Social Studies. School district outlines its 2022-23 Integrated Pest Management program

Berrien Springs Public Schools has adopted an Integrated Pest Management program. Inherent with this are the district's efforts to reduce pesticide use. While it may occasionally be necessary to apply a pesticide, this program does not rely on routine pesticide applications to resolve problems. We use various techniques such as habitat alteration, sanitation, mechanical means, exclusion, etc. to prevent pests from becoming a problem.

As required by Michigan Law, you will receive advance notice of non-emergency application of a pesticide (insecticide, fungicide, or herbicide), other than bait or gel formulation, which is made to the school, school grounds, or buildings. This advance notice of a pesticide application will be given 48 hours before the application by the following two methods: 1. Posting at the primary entrances to your child's school. The entrances that will be posted are the main entrance at each building where you would enter to go to the Principal's office. 2. Posting in the common area located by the main office of the

Please note that notification is not given for use of sanitizers. germicides, disinfectants or antimicrobial cleaners. In certain emergencies, such as an infestation of stinging insects, pesticides may be applied without prior notice to prevent injury to students. but you will be promptly notified following any such application, via the two posting methods identified above.

Parents may review our Integrated Pest Management program and records of any pesticide application upon request by contacting Maintenance Coordinator Ron Bartz at 269-473-0681 or rbartz@ homeoftheshamrocks.org.

Parents or guardians of children attending the school are also entitled to receive the advance notice of a pesticide application, other than a bait or gel formulation, by first class U.S. mail postmarked at least three days before the application, if they so request. District's Asbestos Policy in place; no significant findings

In compliance with the 1989 US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA), we have routinely performed six month periodic surveillance of each of our school buildings for asbestos-containing building materials. The records and the asbestos management plans are on file in each school and

the administrative office.

Villa Environmental Consultants, Inc., which is licensed by the Michigan Department of Labor and Economic Growth and the EPA, has been performing the inspections of all asbestos containing building materials as per the AHERA law. The last six month periodic inspection was in January of 2022 and the last three-

year inspection was conducted in July of 2022.

There were no significant findings during the most recent periodic surveillance or the reinspection for the district. The asbestos materials in this district are currently in good condition and we will continue to manage them in place, as recommended by our accredited asbestos manage-

ment planner. We are not planning asbestos removal during this fiscal year.

The results of the re-inspection are on file in the management plan manual in the school administrative offices. The public is welcome to view these during normal school hours Monday-Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Summer Staff Learning: Professional Development

BSMS teacher walks the hallowed ground of Gettysburg to gain an entirely different appreciation of Pickett's Charge

This June, Berrien Springs Middle School eighth grade history teacher John Hannon attended a week-long program at Gettysburg College in Pennsylvania as a Summer Scholar. The program, "On Hallowed Ground: Gettysburg in History & Memory," hosted by Gettysburg College was sponsored by the National Endowment of the Humanities under its Landmarks of History program. Participants took part in classroom sessions and battlefield tours with leading scholars of the Civil War.

Taking advantage of the Gettysburg National Military Park for learning, teachers were able to appreciate the battle in a way far beyond reading, in a setting preserved and protected by the generosity of the American people. Teachers learned about the fighting over the three days of the battle, stories of soldiers and civilians, and how the battle and

the Civil War are remembered.

More than 50,000 soldiers died in the Battle of Gettysburg in 1863, the bloodiest battle ever fought on American soil. Today, the Gettysburg National Military Park, is a National Park Servicerun memorial to the lives lost during those 3 fateful days of the American Civil War. The Gettyburg battlefield draws those who come to learn about this landmark event.

Additionally, during their off time, teachers had the opportunity to share teaching techniques and resources with a wide variety of colleagues from all grades, subjects, and diverse school districts from across the country.

"I thought I had a good understanding of the battle, but walking the field of Pickett's Charge, gave me an entirely different appreciation of that event, one I hope to share with my students," Mr. Hannon said.

Series 3000: Operations, Finance, and Property 3100 General Operations

3115 Nondiscrimination and Retaliation

The District does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex (including pregnancy, gender identity, or sexual orientation), marital status, disability, or any other legally prohibited basis in admission or access to District programs and activities.

A. Employee complaints of unlawful discrimination (including harassment) and unlawful retaliation are governed by Policy 4104. Employee complaints of Title IX sexual harassment are governed by Policy 3118.

B. Student complaints of unlaw-

ful discrimination (including harassment) and unlawful retaliation are governed by Policy 5202. Student complaints of Title IX sexual harassment are governed by Policy 3118

C. A contractor, volunteer, visitor, employee acting outside the scope of employment, or other nonstudent who believes he or she has been the subject of, or is otherwise aware of, unlawful discrimination (including harassment) or unlawful retaliation must timely file a good faith complaint alleging unlawful discrimination (including harassment) or unlawful retaliation using Form 4104-F with the Superintendent or, if a complaint is against the Superintendent, with the Board President, A complaint of unlawful discrimination

(including harassment) or unlawful retaliation will be promptly and thoroughly investigated. The Superintendent or Board President will forward the complaint to one of the following, as applicable:

- 1. Title IX Coordinator:
- 2. Section 504 Coordinator; or
- 3. Civil Rights Coordinator.

D. Any person may also contact the Office for Civil Rights, U.S. Department of Education ("OCR"), by email at OCR. Cleveland@ed.gov, by telephone at (216) 522-4970, or by fax at (216) 522-2573 regarding compliance with the regulations implementing Title VI, Title IX, Section 504, or any other applicable laws for which OCR has jurisdiction.

E. Contractor and its subcontractors are not to discriminate

against an employee or applicant for employment with respect to hire, tenure, terms, conditions, or privileges of employment, or a matter directly or indirectly related to employment, because of race, color, national origin, religion, sex (including pregnancy, gender identity, or sexual orientation), age, height, weight, and marital status.
