Accelerated learning opportunities produce Math and Science Center Achievements at the Virtual Academy

The Virtual Academy promultifaceted is gram. Although Ber-Virtual rien Springs Academy (BSVA) supports families who prefer full time virtual learning, the school also provides opportunities for on-campus students who primarily attend the middle and high school. During a specific class period, students walk from their respective building to take a scheduled course offering. Students can also take

a course as a 9th hour since the BSVA stays open until 3:30 p.m.

Numerous families make this decision because the student wants an accelerated version of a class, the student is hoping to graduate early, the student wants to open up space in their schedule, or because a unique or career specific class is not offered at the middle or high school that we can offer through virtual coursework (i.e. American Sign Language).

One creative situation that should be highlighted is the positive relationship between the Berrien Springs Virtual Academy and Berrien Springs Middle School. Academically, all students must complete Algebra 1 as an eighth grade student and receive an eligibility score on the SAT. In order to prepare students for eighth grade Algebra, middle school students have participated in their math courses at the middle school along with an accelerated math course at the BSVA for Shamrock Hour 6 and Shamrock Hour 7 in order to prepare students for 8th grade Algebra fully at the BSVA. During the past 2021-2022 school year, all eighth grade students who participated in this approach that applied to the Math and Science Center were welcomed into the program.

This year, we congratulate the achievements of four more Shamrocks, **Joshua Anderson**, **Anna Seo**, **Edwin Seo**, and **Ethan Mugambi**, who were invited to attend the Math and Science Center, along with Mr. Jim Richards who has supported their endeavors over the course of their middle school career.

Fifth grade team focused on advancing students' scores in reading and math to reach NWEA and M-STEP goals

At the start of each school year, our Sylvester scholars take the NWEA MAP benchmark assessment in both reading and math. These assessment scores are mostly used to determine students' areas of strength and areas in which they might benefit from additional instruction and practice.

After each administration of the NWEA, we can make an early prediction for the percentage of students that will likely ACHIEVE proficiency expectations on the M-STEP.

This year the Fifth Grade Teaching Team decided to focus their attention on increasing the percentage of students predicted to ACHIEVE proficiency on the M-STEP as determined by the Winter to Spring scores.

The team devised a multipronged approach to achieve this goal. First, they reviewed the math and reading NWEA data, identifying each student that was already projected to be proficient on the M-STEP in reading, math, or both subjects.

The next step was to iden-

tify for each of these students;

- 1. If they had passed the M-STEP as a Fourth Grader.
- 2. Current Reading and Math IXL scores

It was important to the team that a plan was put in place to keep these students on track to proficiency. The team also wanted to remind these students of their previous successes with taking the M-STEP or, if the student had not passed previously, to work with the student on building their confidence. The teachers used data taken from IXL, a skill builder tool students use regularly, to create individualized skill development plans. The teachers also met with students weekly to evaluate their progress and maintained detailed records of their progress throughout the weeks leading up to M-STEP.

The teachers also reviewed which students had passed the M-STEP as a Fourth Grader, but were not on track to pass the M-STEP as a fifth grader. These students were also pulled into the group of students who were provided with additional direction and support for skill development in IXL.

The teachers hosted a spe-

cial family meeting to help parents and guardians better understand IXL and how it could be used to help their student fill in any skill gaps and gain extra practice and confidence before taking the M-STEP assessment.

The official scores from the M-STEP administered to fifth grade students in early April will are embargoed until the start of the 23-24 school year. However, the fifth grade teachers wanted to celebrate with our Fifth Grade Sylvester Scholars who reached their NWEA goals in Reading and Math before the students transitioned over to the Middle School.

The students who met their NWEA goals were provided with extra recess time to celebrate their accomplishments. As part of this recess, the students thoroughly enjoyed "Jumping for Joy" on two large inflatables to celebrate their successes.

Shamrocks finish spring sports season with numerous awards, and All-Conference and All-State titles

Berrien Springs athletes put on quite a display this season, which should come as no surprise when "spring" is in our name.

The Lady Shamrocks' SOC-CER team had its best season in school history recording all sorts of program firsts. The Lady Rocks Soccer won their first Conference Championship in school history; they went undefeated in the Lakeland Conference. The ladies also had the first winning season in program history with a 13-7 record. The girls got hot in May, going 7-1, and then the team reached the district championship game for the first time. Their magical run was put to an end by a solid Three Rivers team. On their way to that game, the Shamrocks defeated the #1 seeded team from South Haven, 1-0.

The Shamrock BASEBALL team won its first Confer-Championship since ence 2007. The Shamrocks rode the arm of Garrett Brewer to a 7-1 conference record and a 19-12 overall mark. The team played three opponents this season that made it to the state quarterfinals or farther, but they still found a way to string plenty of wins together all season. The boys' season ended in a 3-1 loss to Niles in the District semi-final game.

The Lady Shamrocks' TENNIS program had a total turnaround. In 2022, they won no dual matches, but this season they finished third in a very tough SAC/Lakeland combined conference. At regionals, the girls finished only one point away from qualifying for the state team finals. The team returns nine of its 12 starters for next season. In a very short time, they have become one of the most prolific tennis teams in the area.

The Lady Shamrocks <u>SOFT-BALL</u> team is a young group.

We had so many young players that this was the first time in over ten years that the program fielded a junior varsity team. The varsity team had a different success record-wise than the other teams had, as they finished 10-23 and 4th in the Lakeland Conference. With only ten wins, there was still some serious late-season success. The Shamrock softball team defeated two ranked teams in Division 4 on their final tournament weekend, and this included a 7-6 victory over No. 8 Decatur and a 12-2 win over No. 7 River Valley. To close their year, the softball team fell to No. 5 Lakeshore 6-0 in the pre-district.

The boys' and girls' TRACK teams saw great success, as always, as both teams won their Conference Championships--this made it the 7th in a row for both programs. The boys' team defended their regional championship, and the girls were the regional runners-up. Both teams qualified for the D2 MITCA Team State Meet, an invitational tournament for teams that must qualify by a set of power rankings that the Track Coaches Association sets up. Only the deepest teams in the state get a ticket to that meet. Our boys' team finished 4th out of 15 schools, and the girls finished 9th of 14. We were fortunate that MITCA chose us to host that large meet at Sylvester Stadium.

The Shamrocks put some MHSAA State Champions on the podium to wrap up their track season. Junior Jake Machiniak is the fastest man in Michigan. He won the 100 meters with a school record time of 10.52. The boys' 4x200 team of Machinak, Zander White, Noah Jarvis, and Quimari Haskins were also state champions. To close the day, the girls' 4X100 team of Zariyah Mance, Jasmin Williams, Kirsten Krause, and Grace Constable brought home a state title. That Lady Shamrocks' relay team finished their entire season undefeated and shattered their school

record on multiple occasions.

This has been an exciting spring and school year. We have had numerous All-Conference and All-State athletes. Please check out our social media, website, and newspaper, The Journal Era, for lists of those athletes. We have also had so many people step up to work track meets, prepare our facilities for baseball and softball state tournaments, park cars, run scoreboards, fix fields, take tickets, drive buses, and do countless other jobs that help give our student-athletes a first-class experience. The athletic department cannot thank the Shamrock family enough for the time and effort all of you have given to the program.

We are looking forward to a great 2023-2024 season!

As we close out the 2022-2023 school year, I find myself compelled to reflect on our students' and staff's countless accomplishments and achievements. We have many reasons for celebration, but the most significant is our students' academic achievements.

On June 14, 2023, the Board of Education and the Berrien Springs Public Schools' leadership team held their annual retreat. During the retreat, we dedicated our discussions to student growth and its influence on achievement scores within the classroom districtwide. Our data shows significant progress in reading and math NWEA growth scores. Various factors have influenced these scores, and we are excited to see the progress of our students.

Our district takes great pride in serving a diverse

range of students and families from different backgrounds and life experiences across the state of Michigan. Some of our students and families confront daily obstacles on their path to success. Yet, despite these challenges, our students consistently thrive under the guidance and support of our dedicated and car-
