Assurances

- 6. If the District/PSA determines that it is safe to provide in-person instruction to pupils, the District/PSA will prioritize providing in-person instruction to pupils in grades K to 5 who are enrolled in the District/PSA.

Quality Evidence-Based Assessment Practices

Berrien Springs Public Schools (BSPS) believes data from benchmark assessments are important in monitoring, evaluating patterns and trends in academic performance, in making decisions regarding instructional programming, and providing guidance for standardizing and/or adjusting curriculum and instruction.

BSPS will use benchmark, formative and summative assessment data to continuously monitor our students and adjust as needed to modify instruction.

Progress reports will be available on our website in February and June.

These goals were created by our administrative team on September 10, 2020.

Educational Goals

The NWEA MAP assessment will be given twice during the 2020-2021 school year. Once in the fall within the first 9 weeks of school and then again in the last 9 weeks of school in the spring. We will also continue to give our benchmarking screeners (Aimsweb+ Literacy and Delta Math) in each benchmarking period; Fall, Winter and Spring.

Formative and Summative assessments will be given throughout the school year by grade level and content area teachers.

GOAL 1

All students (K – 8) will improve in Reading/ELA from Fall to Spring as measured by NWEA. Aimsweb+ will be given in the Fall, Winter and Spring to inform our progress toward this goal.

- Mid Year -To be on track for GOAL 1, 50% of students will be proficient at the 40th percentile
 - EOY 75% of students will be proficient at the 40th percentile.

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Goal 2

All students (K – 8) will improve in Math from Fall to Spring as measured by NWEA. Delta Math will be given in the Fall, Winter and Spring to inform our progress toward this goal. Mid-Year

As part of a Guaranteed and Viable Curriculum, all K - 12 content standards taught at Berrien Springs Public Schools have been unpacked and identified as either Essential or Supporting Standards. Each year these standards are reviewed to ensure proper pacing throughout the school year. This ensures all students have access and opportunity to learn grade level content. These same pacing guides will be used during in person instruction as well as in our remote learning classrooms. We will utilize Schoology (6-12) and Seesaw (K - 5) to house our curriculum

Throughout the school year, teachers will meet in grade level or content area PLCs to review data from benchmark assessments, screeners and any other formative and summative data generated to inform instruction and prioritize K -12 standards for the 2020-2021 school year.

Throughout the school year grade level content is the focus. If a student is not at grade level, Multi-Tiered Support is given to provide intervention and acceleration toward attaining grade level content.

Berrien Springs Public Schools will provide parents or legal guardians with standards-based progress reports and report cards. We regularly assess students at the district and classroom level to determine if they are making progress.

In K – 5, parents will receive a Progress Report at the end of the First and Third Quarters of School. At the end of the Semester and End of the Year, parents or legal guardians of elementary students will receive a standards-based report card for their student.

Secondary students 6-12 receive standards-based report cards at the end of each semester of school. The middle school will send Prograss Reports at the end of the First and Third Quarters. Parents and legal guardians can also check students' grades daily through the Schoology Learning Management System.

In addition to these regular intervals of reporting to parents, teachers also keep parents informed of any concerns through the use of emails and phone calls. Parents are encouraged to call or email their student's teacher if they have a concern.

All students in face to face and remote/virtual programs at Berrien Springs Public Schools have been issued either an iPad (Young $5s - 2^{nd}$ grade) or a Chromebook (grades 3-12).

To provide equitable opportunities for all of our students during the school year, we developed a plan to assist students that do not have access to the internet. Our families in need of Internet connection have been issued a hotspot. We continue to monitor the needs of our families as their circumstances may change, and will issue devices and hotspots as needed.

Technology support is also available.

When school starts, students' IEPs, IFSPs, and 504 plans will be reviewed in coordination with general and special education teachers and/or providers to address any data-driven accommodations and/or services that are needed due to known changes in students' needs.

For students from birth to five, those with identified special needs, and those attending CTE programming, intervention and support services will be integrated into the student's program immediately upon the start of school.

The district has established structures for general and special education teachers and/or providers to collaborate and communicate regarding student performance and student needs on IEP goals and objectives with special consideration regarding assistive technology and accessibility.

The district ensures a continuation of services for students receiving speech and language, occupational therapy, physical therapy, or social work services within their IFSP or IEP. The district also ensures a method for the continuation of evaluation for students suspected of having a disability as well as those requiring re-evaluation.

Students with IEPs will be provided with learning opportunities in the same manner as general education students. These learning opportunities will include accessibility options as well as materials that have been accommodated and modified. Teachers will be supporting students through in-person or virtual learning environments.

The district will remain responsible for the free appropriate public education (FAPE) of its students who are eligible for special education services with an individualized education program (IEP).

District Administration and Instructional staff will work collaboratively to:

- Include technology and non-technology options.

Dual Credit

For our students in dual enrollment courses, we will ensure that the students have the appropriate materials and support to complete those courses. We are working closely with Lake Michigan College to assure student success using the resources available at both the District and the college.

Early Middle College

Students will continue with their LMC coursework as directed by the College and Berrien RESA. In cases where these EMC students are taking BSPS courses for LMC courses, the above paragraph applies.

Career and Technical Education

When weighing content decisions for CTE students, essential skills/knowledge must be considered along with what is required for students to earn industry credentials and meet standards of employers/certifying bodies. We will work with the Berrien RESA CTE Director as well as state level CTE directives to ensure our students have the ability to complete these courses.

Teachers may choose to use various delivery methods for materials and evaluation of knowledge.

Presentation may include, but not be limited to, video, YouTube, self-guided activities, posting

materials with discussion and questioning, reading of texts and readings, essay writing, and sequential process flow. Additional recommendations for CTE are being developed at the county level and will be shared with students by teachers through normal means of communication.

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
